Definitions

- **Business Ready Acres:** Acres developed by BRC projects
- **Business Park Acres:** Development in a designated commercial/industrial area
 - **Established:** Partially developed area. Improvements increased capacity for existing businesses and future tenants
 - **New:** Land was previously undeveloped or under developed
- **Business Ready Building Space:** Square-foot measure of all building space constructed by BRC projects
- **Spec Buildings Space:** Building construction specifically for new business attraction



BRC Project Types

- **Business Committed Projects** – Infrastructure to facilitate the start-up, retention, expansion, or location of a specific committed business. Maximum award is \$3 million with a 10% or 30% match (cash and/or in-kind).
- **Managed Data Center Projects** – Reduction of the utility cost for electrical and/or broadband for the recruitment or expansion of managed data centers of sufficient redundancy. Maximum award is \$2,250,000.
- **Community Readiness Projects** – No specific business is committed to expand or locate in the community. Infrastructure to prepare a community for future business development under a specific community plan. Maximum award is \$3 million with a 10% or 30% match (cash and/or in-kind).
- **Downtown Development Projects** – Community Readiness project located in a downtown or Main Street Program area. Maximum award is \$2 million with a 15% or 30% match (cash and/or in-kind).
- **Community Enhancement Projects** – Infrastructure to improve aesthetics or quality of life to make a community attractive for business development. No specific business is committed to expand or locate in the applicant's community. Maximum award is \$500,000 with a 50% match.
- **Child Care/Senior Care Projects** – Infrastructure to facilitate the start up or expansion of a child care or senior care facility. Maximum award is \$1 million with a 15% match.
- **BRC Planning Projects** – Document that creates or further develops a community's economic development strategy. Projects require a 25% cash match
 - **Economic Development Plans.** Maximum award of \$50,000.
 - **Feasibility Studies.** Maximum award of \$25,000.
 - **Promotional Plans.** Maximum award of \$25,000.
 - **Tourism Plans.** Maximum award of \$25,000.
 - **Regional Targeted Industry Plans.** Maximum award of \$50,000.
- **Large Infrastructure Projects** – Funding for large scale infrastructure projects to encourage business development. Funding is determined on a case by case basis. Established as budget footnote in 2013.



Governor's Data Center Funds

Definition: Legislature appropriated funding for the infrastructure assisting in the recruitment of data centers. Data Center construction costs must be greater than \$50M. Funds may be awarded as grants or loans.

- **2012: Project Summit**
 - \$5M award to Laramie County
 - Funds were used for construction of infrastructure to assist in the recruitment of Microsoft Corporation
 - Microsoft will invest more than \$112M in the facility of ten years and create at least 17 new jobs with a median wage of \$39.32
- **2015: Project Nephogram**
 - \$5M award to Laramie County
 - Funds were used for construction of two water towers, water/sewer lines and other infrastructure necessary for the expansion of Microsoft Corporation
 - Microsoft will invest \$208M over the next three years and create 25 new jobs; 18 above the county's median wage of \$17.38

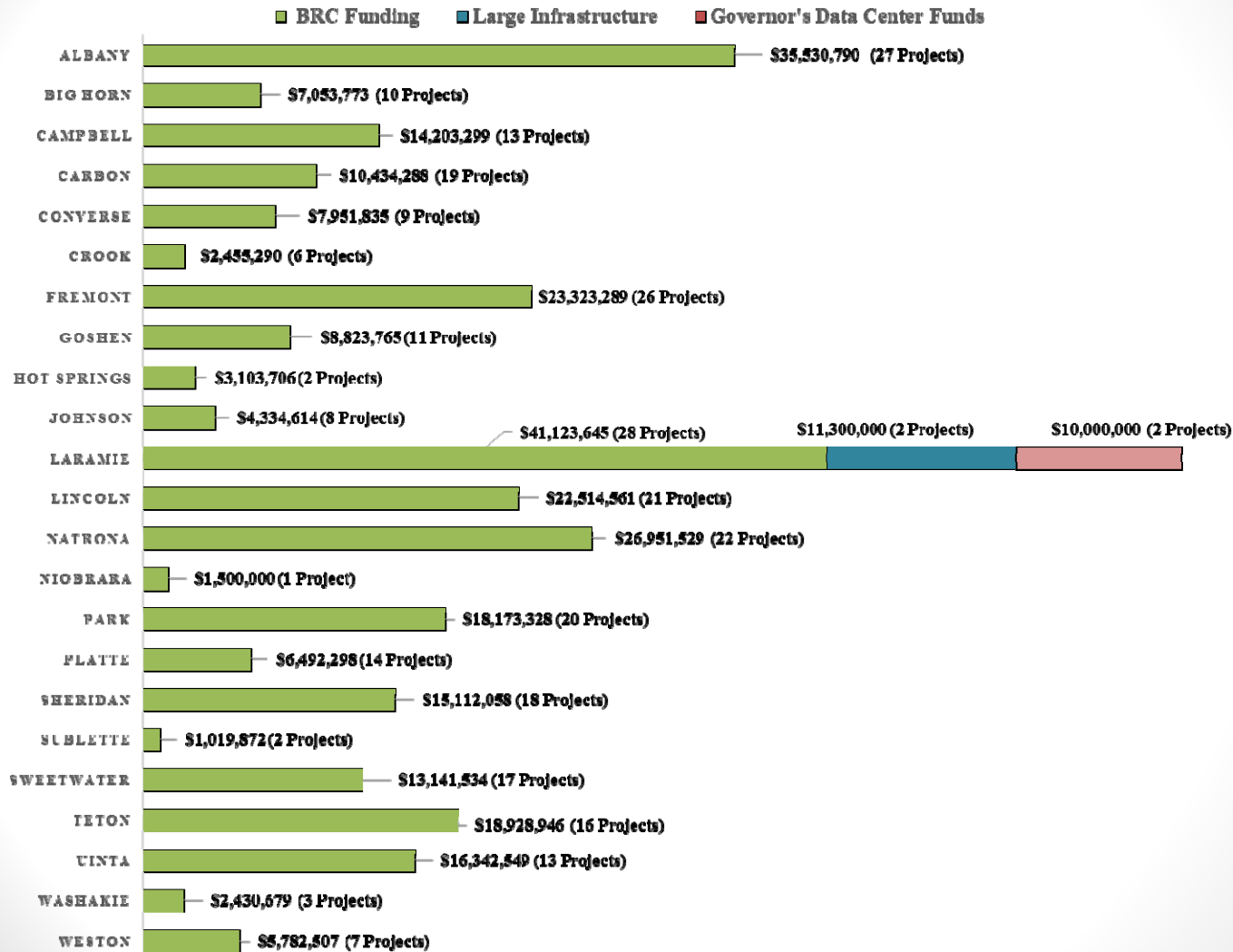


A Note about Data Limitations

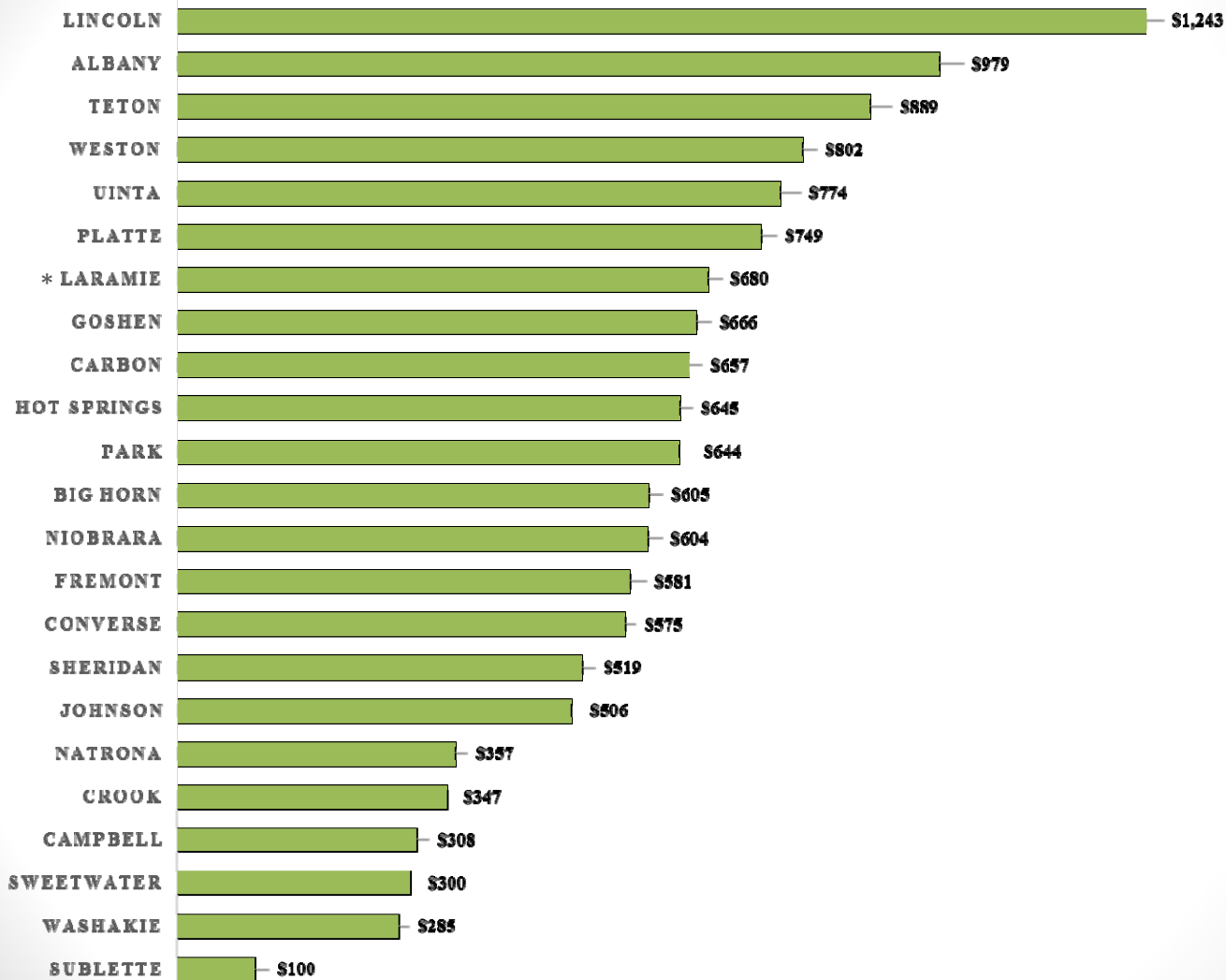
- Data is current as of June 30, 2015

Funding by County



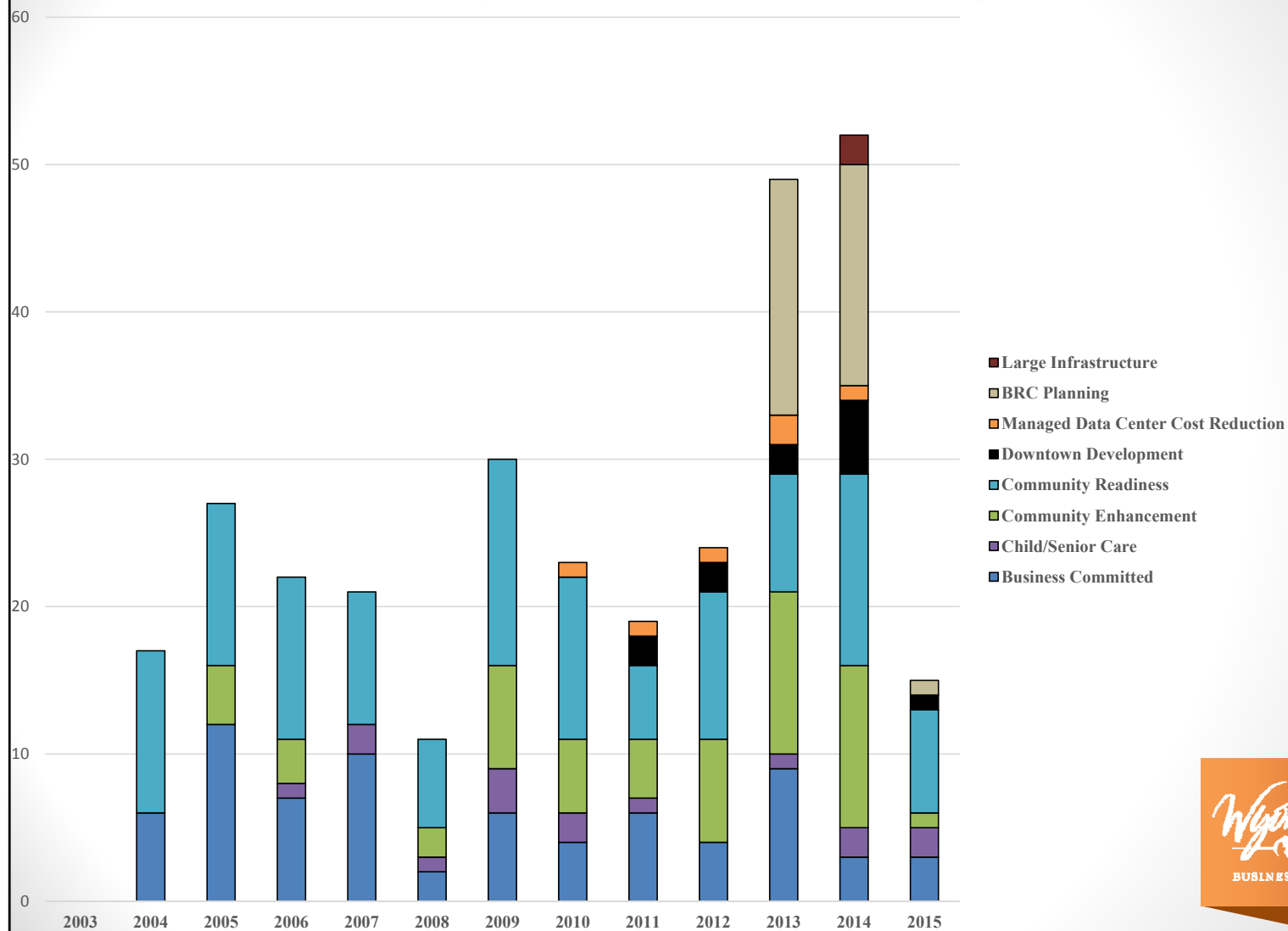
Funding Per Capita



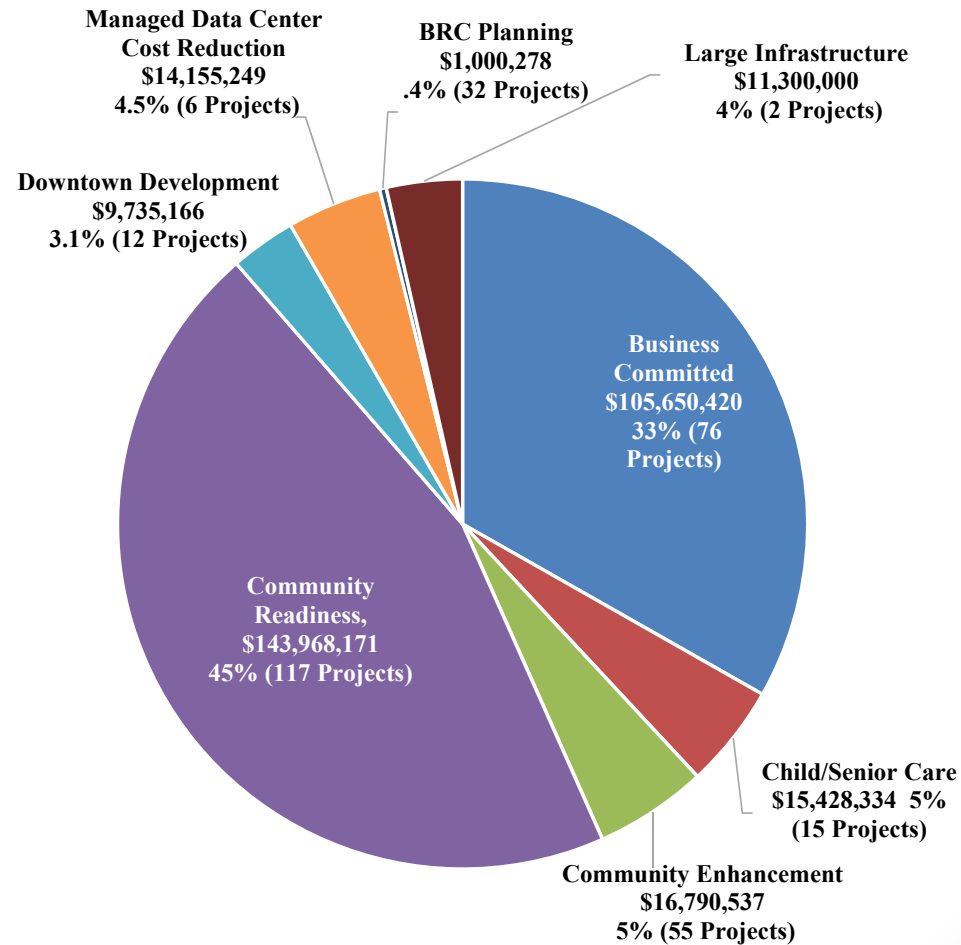

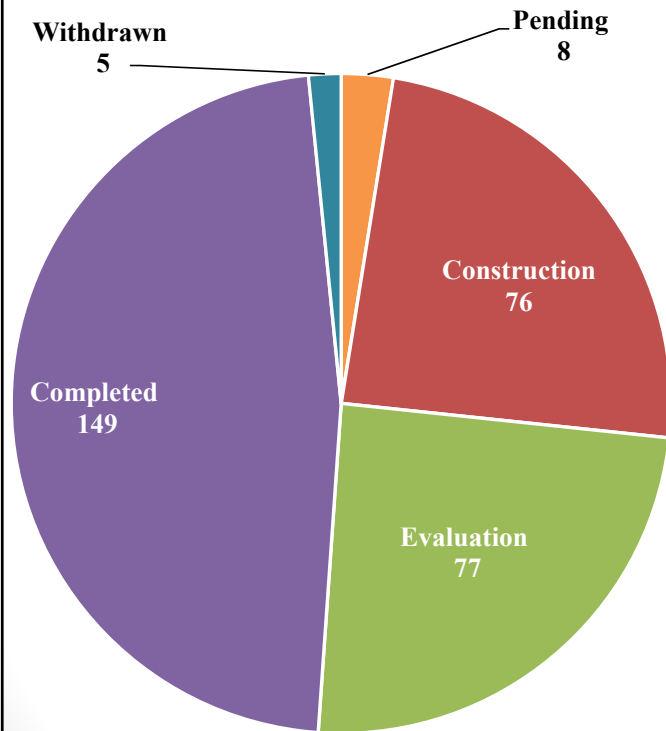
Number of Projects Awarded by Year

Evaluation: Project construction has been completed, and grantee is required to submit performance reports for three years

Completed: 3 years after the project has passed, no additional reporting is required

Withdrawn: Project initiated, some funds were expended



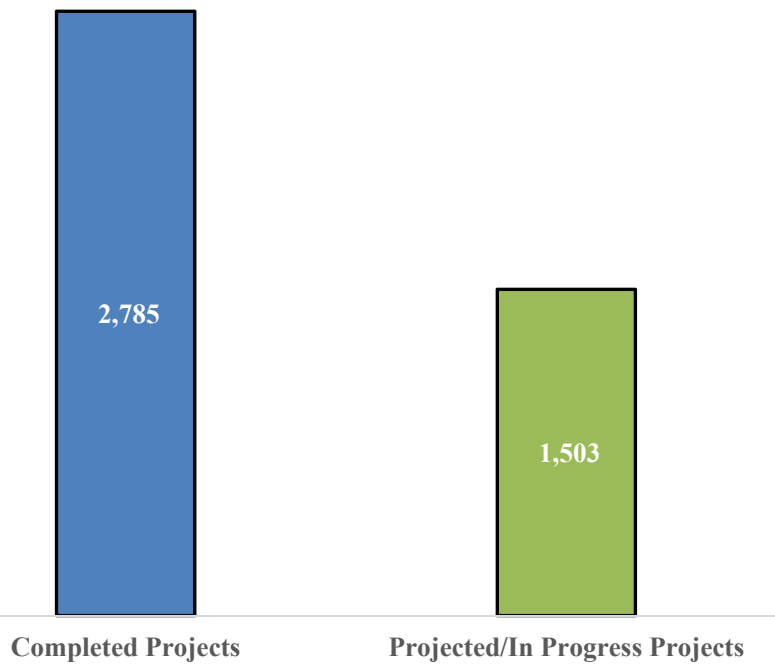

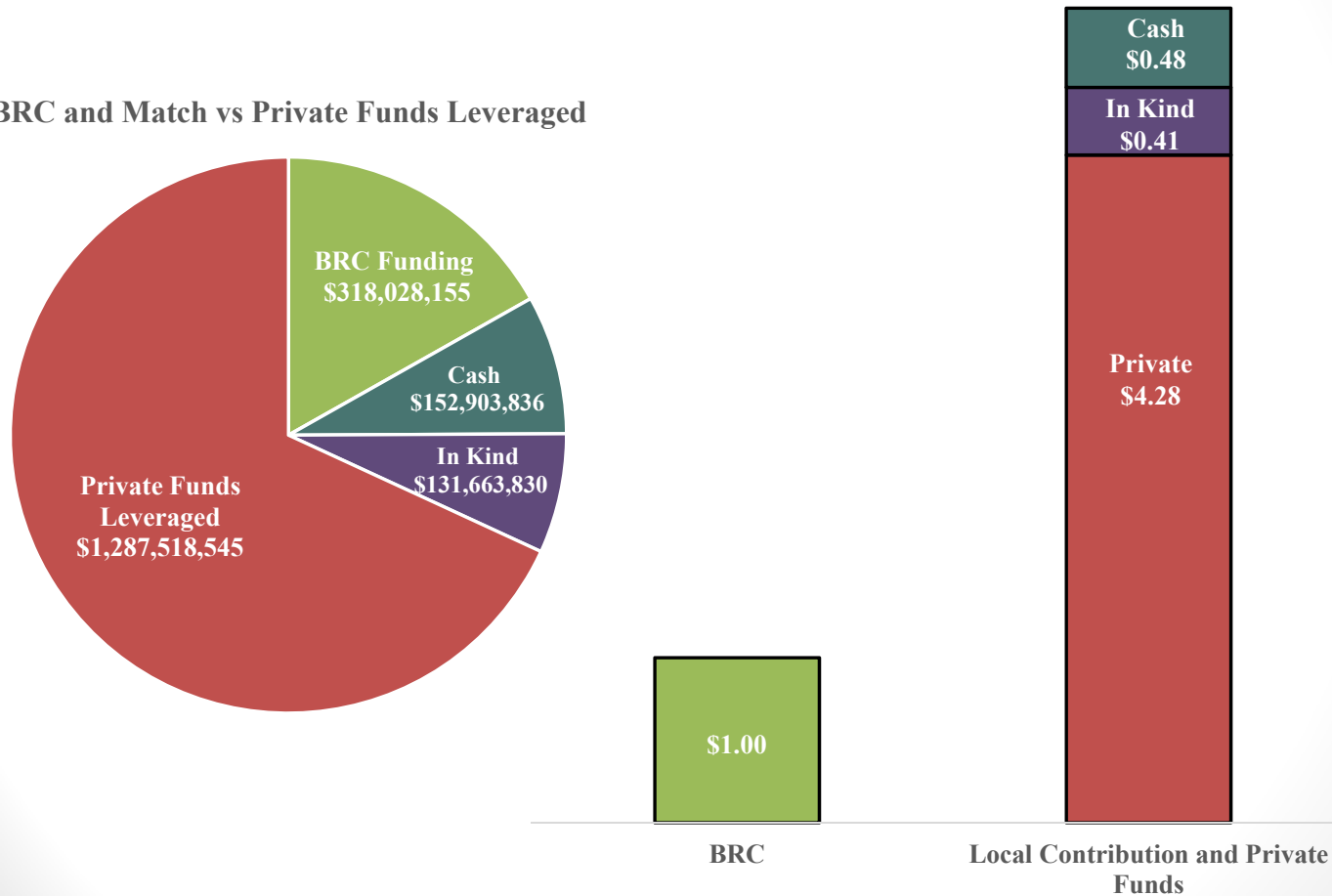

BRC and Match vs Private Funds Leveraged

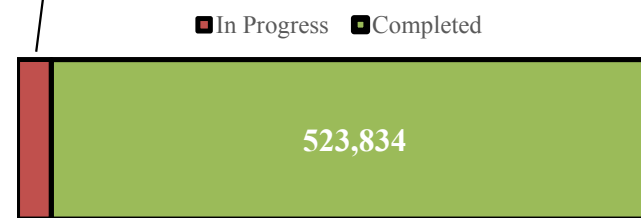

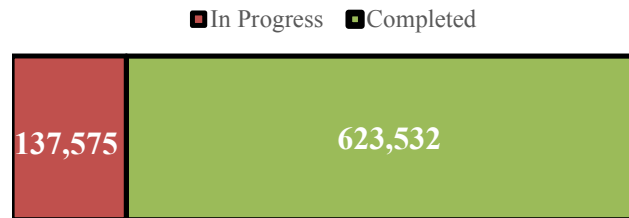
Public Infrastructure by the Numbers

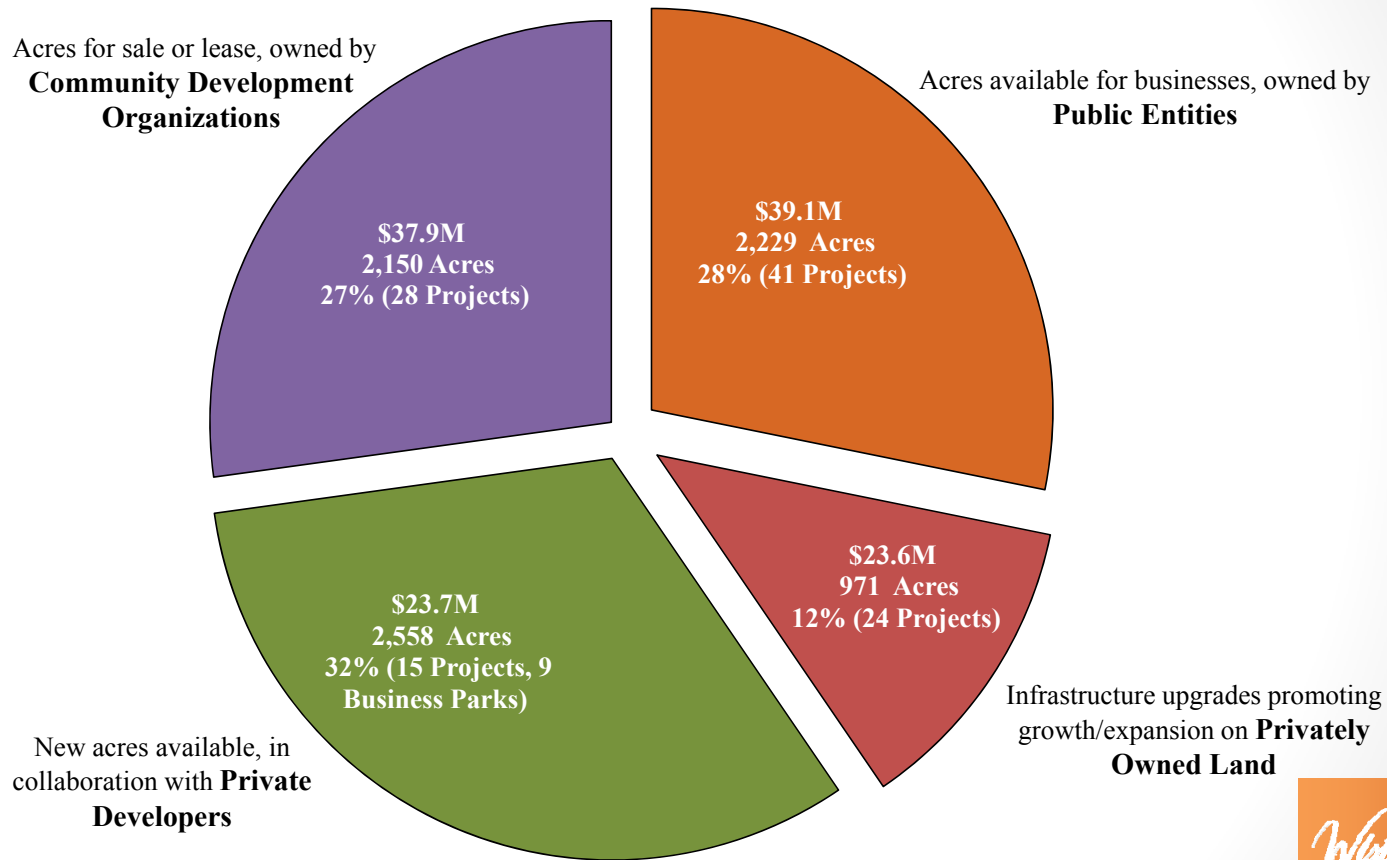
Water/Sewer (Linear Feet)

Ownership of Business Ready Acres

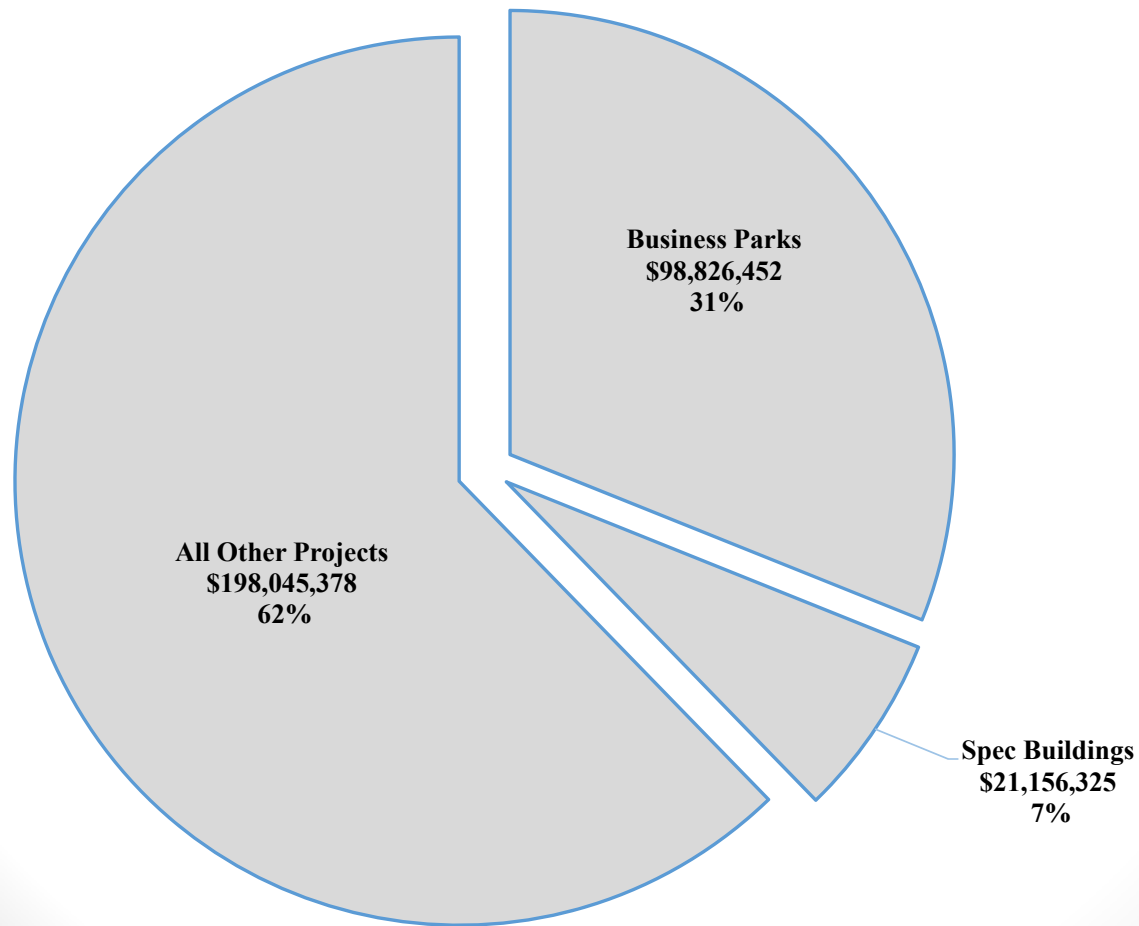

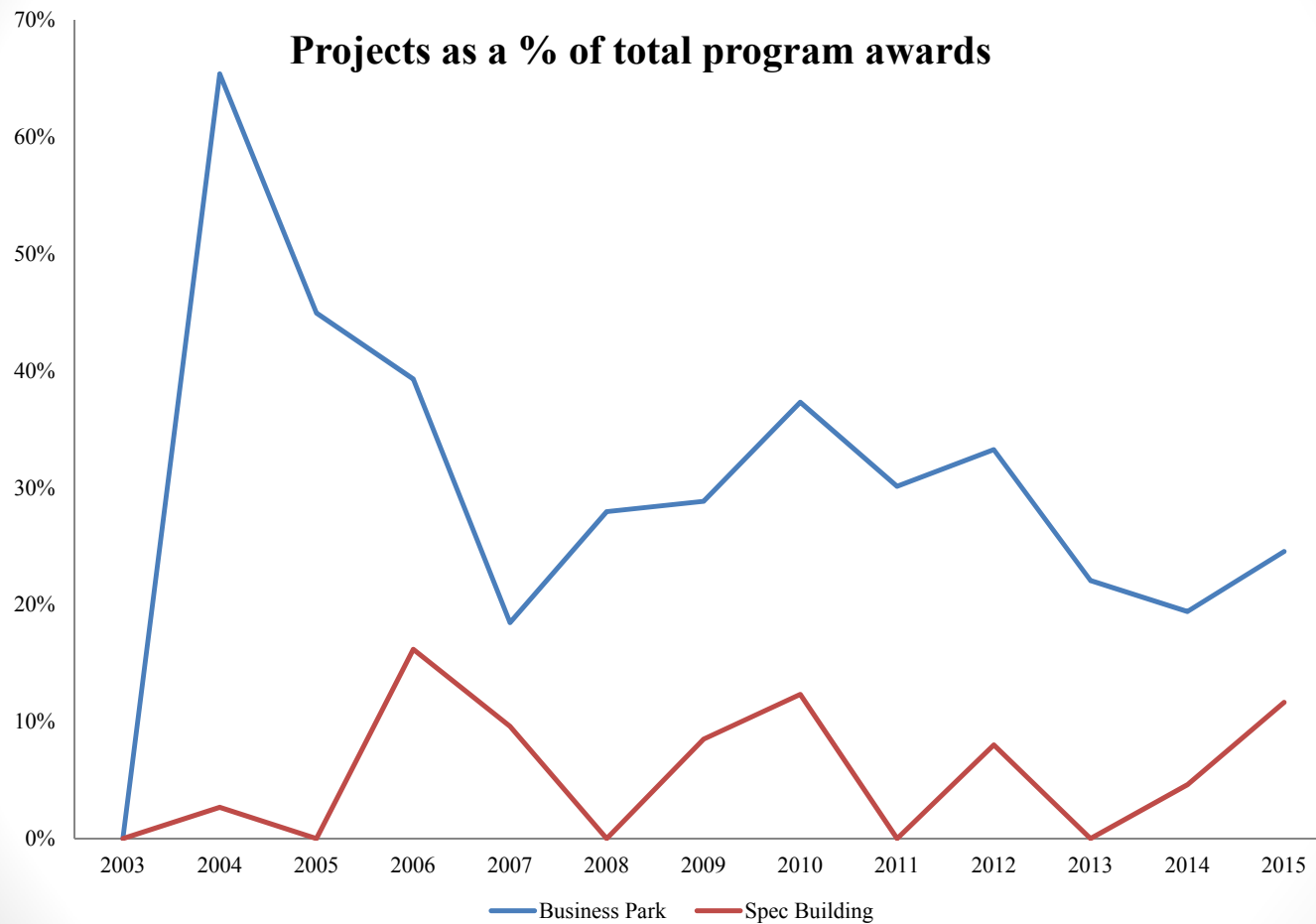

Business Park/Spec Building Trends

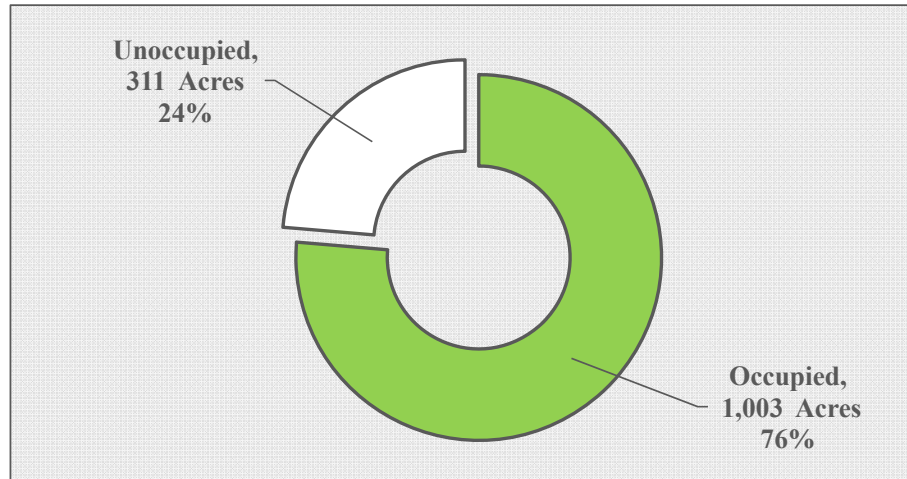

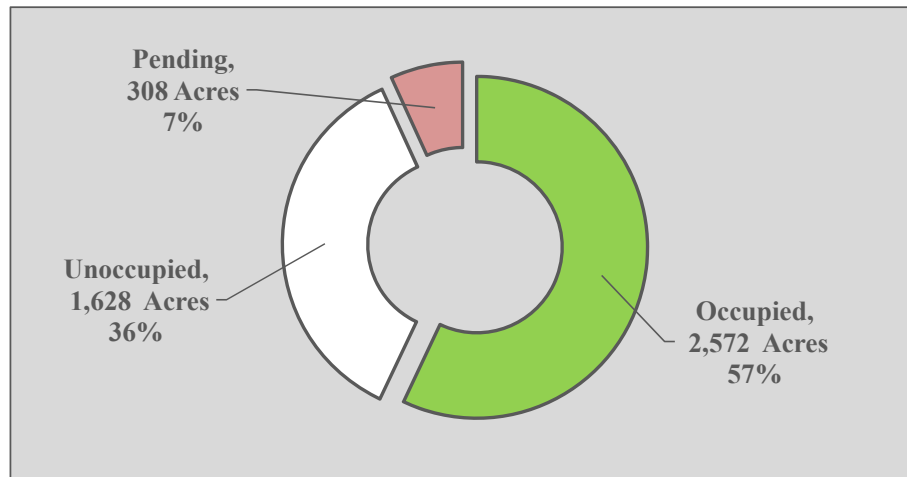

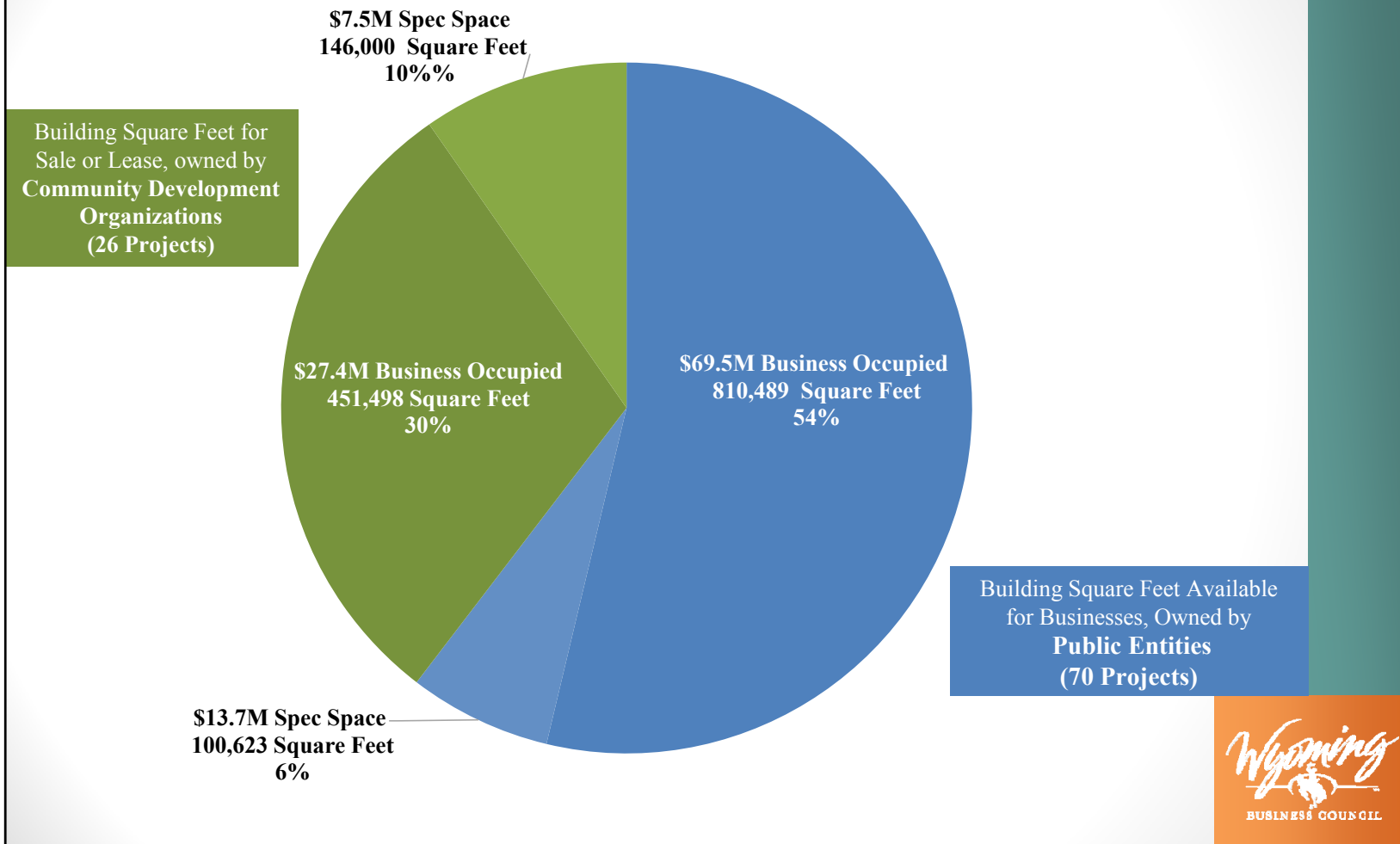

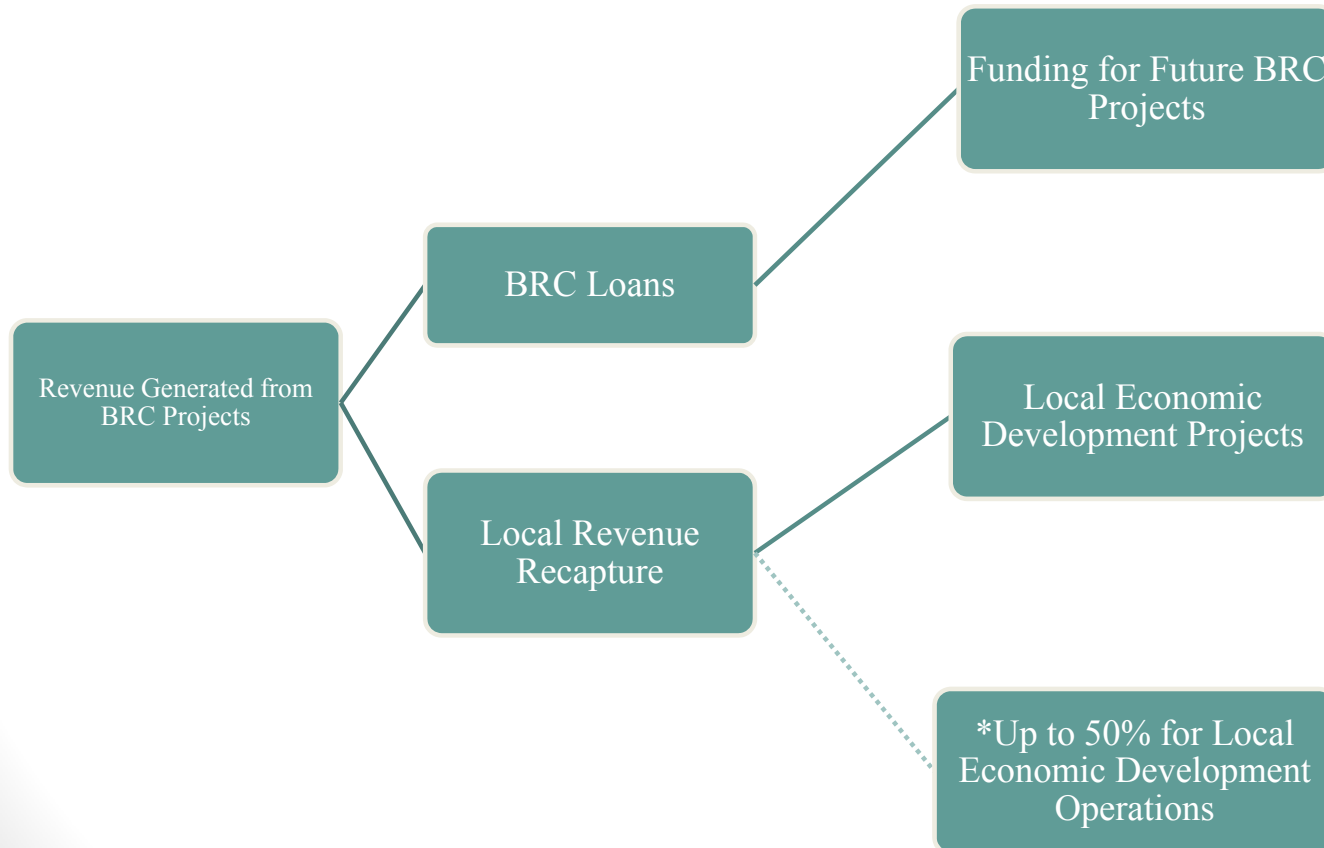


What is Revenue Recapture?

- Revenue (lease payments, lot sales) generated by a BRC project be recaptured by the applicant and used for local community and economic development activities
 - **Local Revenue Recapture:** Income to the recipient or community development organization. An approved plan must be in place for how recaptured funds will be managed and used for economic development. Revenue recaptured funds may be used for up to 50 percent of economic development operations and management costs, if matched 1:1 with other funds
 - **WBC Revenue Recapture:** Income to the recipient which must be remitted to the BRC program, under terms stated in the project grant agreement.
 - **Revenue from BRC Loans:** Income to the recipient which must be used to make annual loan payments to the BRC program. Loans are secured by the asset funded by the WBC and are non-recourse against the applicant's other assets



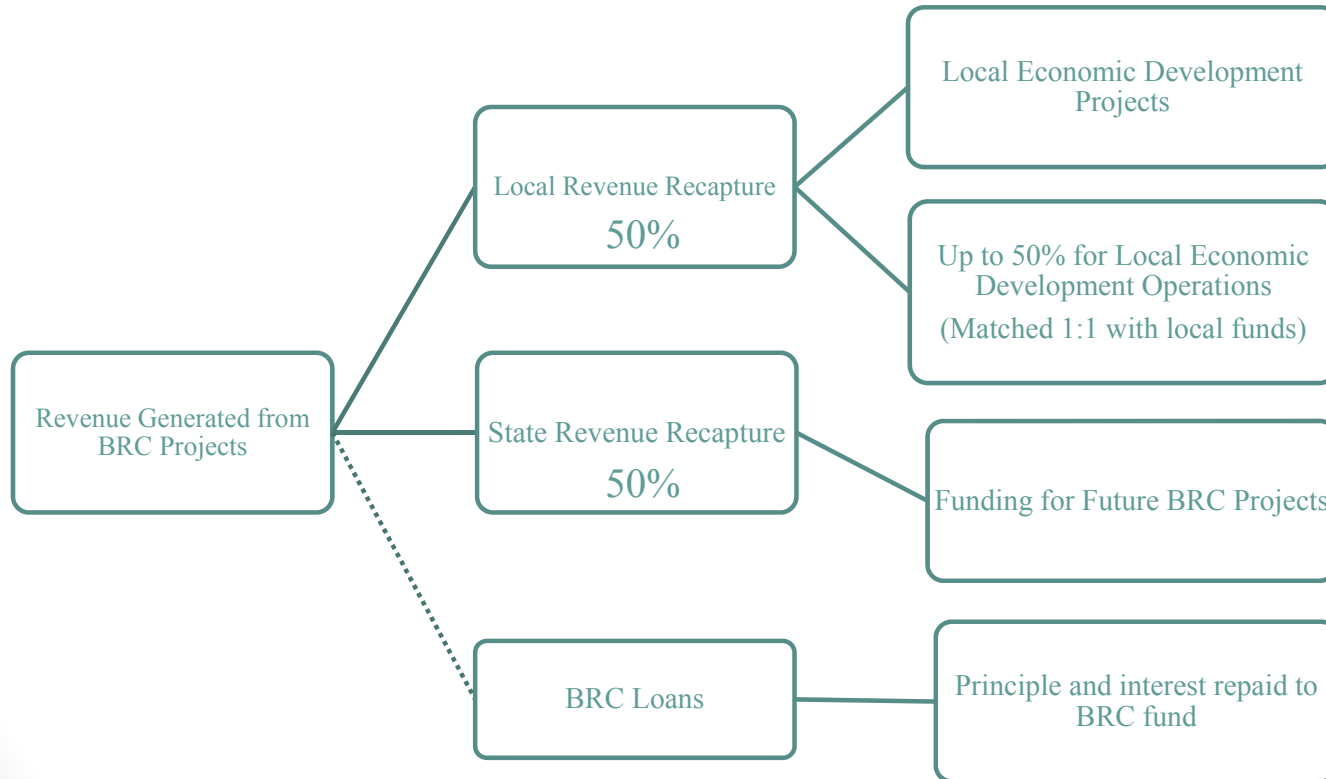
Current Revenue Recapture Process

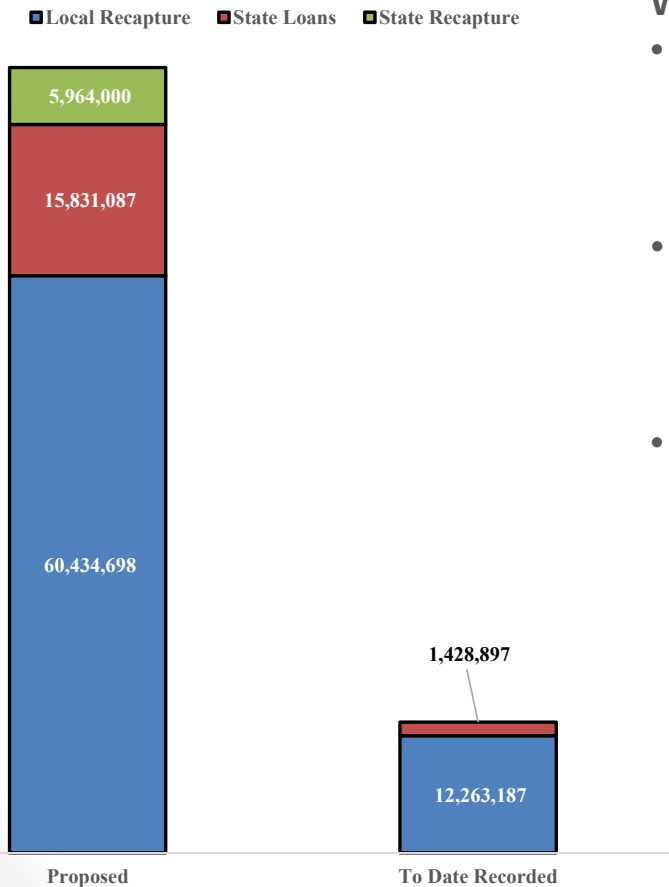

Revenue Recapture



Why is actual amount lower than proposed?

- *Inconsistent time horizons:* Grantees report performance information for 3 years, but revenue recapture plans can take 10 or more years to execute.
- *Data is primarily from the last four years:* Recent staff policy has been to track revenue recapture and ask require a revenue recapture plan
- *Local project contacts:* Local government staff required to complete annual reports are often not the same people involved with the project. This creates a disconnect that can affect the quality of information
